

This is Ruby Jubilee, your 2020-2021 Raffle Quilt. I am writing to you because I am so lonely. We Raffle Quilts are used to getting a lot of love, but the pandemic has caused problems with getting the love to the coffers of IQI. Please understand that income from the sale of raffle quilt tickets is a major way to fund our guild.*

Unfortunately, my handler, Sue Sweeney, cannot mail each of you your ticket packets because it is illegal according to USPS regulations. Your mail carrier cannot deliver them. Plus, to whom would you sell these tickets? Most of us sell them to friends and family. There haven't been any opportunities to sell at quilt shows, or at other quilt guilds. As of March 1, 2020, the total amount for 2020 is \$1,165; 2021 is \$300. In normal years, your raffle quilt brings \$2500-3000.

I am asking you, IQI members, to show me some love. You can send a check to Sue Sweeney, 1829 Elm Avenue, Northbrook, 60062. Let her know how you want your tickets filled out and she will send you back the stubs (that's okay with USPS). Or, go to our website in the "SHOP" section where I am there in all my splendor. Just a click and PayPal does the rest. When Sue gets confirmation of your payment, she will contact you for how you want the stubs filled out. Couldn't be any easier.

NEW FALL RETREAT!

IQI will hold its first fall retreat on October 1-3rd at the Crowne Plaza Chicago-Northbrook. This newly-designed hotel is equipped with a 6-foot table for each sewer, power strips etc. and you will load in (luggage carts abound) on the main floor where we are setting up! Due to covid-19 protocols, personal food and drinks (including alcohol) are not permitted in the sewing ballroom. However, they are permitted in your sleeping room. Food and beverages are available for purchase, and meals are being ordered. No meal on Friday night, all meals on Saturday and brunch on Sunday. The retreat ends at 3 pm on Sunday.

No workshops, just your sewing time is planned. Block of the month (BOM) patterns will be available. There are just 30 spaces for IQI members, and signups begin April 1st. A non-refundable deposit of \$100.00 is due followed by the remaining amount on July 1st. Single room with food: \$365.00; Double room with food: \$265.00.

MEMBER PROFILE

Meet Barb Cushing!

My sewing journey began when in grade school I sewed two red bandanas together to make a square blouse. By high school, I was designing dresses and making my own patterns.

When I went off to college, I no longer had access to my mother's Singer Featherweight and ceased sewing. I remember being much more into jigsaw puzzles. I graduated college and got a job. Of course, I was going to need an entirely new wardrobe for my new job. I purchased, with my still to be earned first paycheck, my very own Singer sewing machine. I was off again on my sewing journey. I made a bunch of blouses, vests and pants which was great, but when the holidays approached I was in seventh heaven making 5" square random patchwork quilts for the female family members, ties and shirts for the males. Wow! was I surprised to see a picture of my brother-in-law 20 years later still wearing the shirt I had made for him! My sister still uses the quilt on her bed!

Life moved on, I got several other jobs, got married, but remember little machine sewing during this time. I enjoyed a great deal of hand sewing needle-point, cross stitch, embroidery and punch needle rugs, which I could carry with me and work on anytime and anywhere. I also was very unhappy with my Singer and there may lay the reason.

I had a daughter and purchased the Kenmore sewing machine which I use to this day. I was sewing again—and loved sewing for my daughter. I made bibs, cute mattress covers, blankets, mother/daughter matching dresses and dresses/rompers for her as well as curtains and pillows for her bedroom.

My daughter was followed by 4 boys and I have to say, sewing for boys was not as much fun! I continued sewing many Halloween costumes, appliqued beach towels of each child and cousins, blankets,

pillows, curtains, drapes, slipcovers etc. When my daughter reached high school and started going to dances, I began making dresses for these events for her and several of her friends. When one of my brother-in-laws got married, the bride gave each attendant a pattern and material. I was asked to make one of dresses. The one I made was voted BEST. I think it was because I was the only one who used an invisible zipper.

Years marched on, I got divorced, went back to work and the sewing machine went back into storage. Nine years ago, I sold the family home and moved into a cozy condo in Evanston. I took my trusty Kenmore to Vogue Fabrics for an overhaul just in case I was going to sew again.

Shortly after I moved, I met Melanie Anderson, we talked and she, of course, got me excited about sewing and convinced me to join Piecemakers and IQI—even to agree to being the VP of Contracts!

I think of myself as a seamstress more than a quilter. I have made some quilts, challenges and mystery and small ones for children. I have made many masks and I make dresses for the organization "Dress a Girl Around the World."

My boys have fond memories of the sewing machine set up at the end of the kitchen table where I could sew and supervise. But now, a Janome, a Christmas/Pandemic gift to myself, sits on my dining table and I supervise my dog.
