This workshop project can be finished in a day. Students have an opportunity to work with different textiles, wool, silk, multiple genres of cotton and even home dec; how to handle each on a small scale; it's a pillow or a table mat. There is a kit and each colorway is slightly different in terms of materials within it, but silk and wool are constants. There are 6 color options. The kit costs are \$49.50.

Judy Gauthier "Demystifying the color wheel / quick cuttin methods for scrap quilts"

modern quilt shop, in Ripon, Wisconsin. Judith will show us how to use fabric scraps to create beautiful and surprising pattern designs.

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March 5th Schoolhouse Supply List

Paper Piecing Mini-workshop 1 pm-2 pm

We'll learn about using foundations for patchwork. We'll make a few blocks to practice and design a few blocks. Please bring the following supplies to work with. If there are some which

you don't have, we can share. Even a sewing machine can be shared.

- · Sewing machine in good working order
- Thread
- Small scissors
- Mechanical pencil
- Pins with a tiny head or a flat head
- A small devise for finger pressing (roller or stylus) if you have one.
- A variety of fabrics in small pieces: quarters or smaller should be fine as we will just make sample blocks. Select some light, some dark but solids, plaids, small to medium prints work best. Select some greens (think trees and shamrocks), some reds (think a Valentine heart), some the colors of flowers, some blues including sky blue, some light neutrals....
- Small cutting mat and a rotary cutter
- Add-a-quarter ruler or any small acrylic ruler(s) with a line 1/4" from the edge. The length could be 6" to 15" or one at each end of that range.

It's a good idea to put your name on your rulers when you'll be working in a group.

Faux Corded Binding Techniques 11 am-12 pm

We'll learn about different binding techniques. You will bind the quilt or quilt sandwich you

bring. Please bring the following supplies to work with. If there are some which you don't

have, we can share. Even a sewing machine can be shared.

- Small quilt OR a 12 x 12 quilt sandwich stitched 1/4" from perimeter.
- 2 HIGH contrast fabrics to coordinate with quilt
- 2 threads to match
- Sewing machine, cords and foot pedal
- Walking foot
- New needle
- Small 1 x 6" ruler or similar
- Favorite marking pen/pencil
- Pins
- Scissors
- Rotary cutter
- Long ruler

Bowl Cozies 10 am-11 am

We'll learn how to make a bowl cozy for use in your microwave. Please bring the following supplies to work with. If there are some which you don't have, we can share. Even a sewing machine can be shared.

Melanie likes to use sample blocks instead of plain fabric, they make more interesting cozies. But as long as you have a couple of matching (size) squares and batts, you're good to go.

- 10 inch squares of fabric (2 per cozy) (or if you want a larger cozy, make it larger)
- 10 inch squares of cotton batting (2 per cozy)
- Ruler
- Rotary cutter
- Pencil

See Through Gadget Zipper Bags 2 pm-3 pm

We'll learn how to make a zipper bag. If you like, you will be able to make all three with the supplies below. Please bring the following supplies to work with. If there are some which you don't have, we can share. Barb will supply the vinyl. Even a sewing machine can be shared.

For all three bags you will need:

- Prints: 2 fat quarters
- Fusible Woven Interfacing: 1 yd
- Fusible Fleece (Pelon 987F) 1 fat eighth (9" x 24")
- 3 14" zippers
- zipper foot
- walking foot
- tissue paper
- pins or Clover wonder clips
- rotary cutter
- small cutting board

MEMBER PROFILE

Meet Amy Parker!

From the time I was very young, I loved both color and pattern. I was an arts and crafts kid from the getgo, drawing, painting, and embroidering and patching clothes in the hippy 70's. I did pottery and silk-screen. My grandmother taught me how to make curtains, so I could sew a straight line, which is pretty much all I know how to do with a sewing machine!

I created my first quilt based on a Native American blanket design with a central medallion and large zig zags at the ends. In order to make the zig zag element, I literally cut out a 48" zig zag piece of fabric and tried to sew it into an opposite-cut large piece of background fabric. By hand. Things did not go well.

I got smarter and made my next quilt from a magazine pattern. It required hand-appliqueing 100 hearts. If any of it was machine-pieced, it would have been done on my grandmother's ancient Pfaff, built into one of those old flip-top sewing tables. I still have that Pfaff and table, but now it is a plant stand.

Sometime in the 80's, I took a quilting class. Learned hand piecing, cutting cardboard templates with scissors, and hand quilting. To this day, I love handwork. I was largely self-taught after that. I loved Amish quilts. I researched ethnic/regional designs and recreated them for an Amish-based wall hanging. Then I had two kids, and it lived in a closet for five years before I had time to finish it. People would ask how long it took to make something like this and I would laugh out loud.

I bought a modern sewing machine (but never liked it). I always had a project in the works even if it took years to finish. I joined IQI but was too busy working and raising kids to be really involved. The internet taught me how to use a rotary cutter and piece accurately. I bought a better machine and learned to quilt using a walking foot and then to free motion. I studied every free motion quilter out there. YouTube was my best teacher!

I started going to quilt shows. I was mesmerized watching them quilt out the loveliest patterns with multicolored thread on black fabric. (Those longarm manufacturers knew what they were doing when they demo'd those machines!) In 2015, I'd had it with my job. I wanted a longarm. I did a totally scientific poll of my Facebook friends to see if I should quit the job and start my own longarming business. They said yes, so I did it and Evanston Quilt Company was born in 2016.

Now I make fewer quilts myself but I still get to work with color and pattern. It's a win-win! I never tire of the challenges, I have the nicest clients, and I make time for friends, family and my beloved gardens. In addition to IQI, I also belong to the Chicago Modern Quilt Guild and am a huge fan of the highly graphic

modern style of quilt design. I love my quilting communities so much talent, so much to learn, so much fun!
